## VOLUNTEER PROFILE: DIANNE BACKUS

Our volunteer of the month is Dianne Backus. Dianne has been with us for a little over a year and has already donated 180+ hours of her time here, volunteering for Shindig 2022, Read and Ride summer camps, Girlz in the Barn, and our regular therapeutic riding classes.

Dianne grew up in Ann Arbor, MI, and started being a part of 4-H when she was 13. (She was

lucky that her 4-H leader's daughters were grown, and he had a barn full of horses she could ride!) She was able to ride with 4-H until she graduated from high school. After graduation, she bought her own Quarter Horse gelding, and showed him in Western and Hunt Seat.

Dianne married her husband, Don, and they moved to Battle Creek. They still had their Quarter Horse, and Dianne was fortunate enough to quickly get a job with the Kellogg Company, where she worked as a secretary and later in Consumer Affairs. She worked there for 30 years until she retired in 2006, and she has stayed busy ever since!

Shortly after they moved to Battle Creek, they bought a Quarter Horse mare and ended up breeding and showing quarter horses. She became involved in the Rebel Riders 4-H group in Calhoun County and worked with them for 10 years.

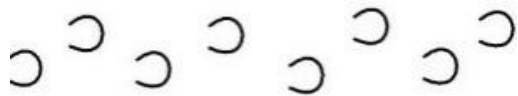
Sadly, Dianne had a riding accident which caused her to need back surgery, and she could not ride any longer. They sold their horses, and she was horseless for eight years afterward. She ended up buying another Quarter Horse mare (Stinky) and although she could not ride, she was able to show Fitting and Showing, and was very successful in the show circuit. Stinky was also being shown by the trainer and another student at the barn and racked up many accolades. Stinky ended up retiring due to foot

issues and then passed away, but she had a good, long life.

Dianne and Don have a winter home in Carefree, Arizona, where they spend most of the fall and winter. While there, a friend suggested that she go to a local Therapeutic Riding center, Silver Spur, where she could continue to volunteer with horses and children. Not only is Dianne dedicated to the Cheff Center, but she gets to continue volunteering while she is “wintering” in Arizona!

Dianne and Don will be celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary (Congratulations!) this fall and taking a cruise before they go to Arizona for the winter. We will miss her this fall and will look forward to her return next spring!

Phillip is an 11-year-old American Paint Horse (APHA), that stands 16.3 hands high. Everyone has already noticed what a fun personality he has!

In his previous careers, Phillip was a show horse for a while, before transitioning to a racetrack in California where he was a pony horse.

A pony horse is a track or lead pony - horses that offer support and comfort for racehorses as they travel to and from the racetrack. Often, they are older than their charges, and a track pony or lead pony offers guidance and support, which allows the racehorse to focus on their job rather than the sights and sounds of the racetrack.

Phillip didn't particularly love his job as a pony horse, which is how we were so fortunate that he ended up at Cheff.

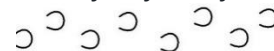

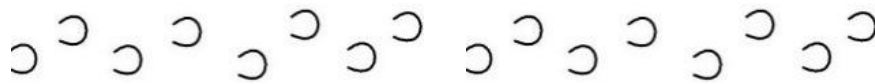
Greg owned CC Supply, a landscaping company in Richland, until 2012 when he sold it to one of his employees.

## FUN FACT

### Equestrian Events at the Special Olympics

Earlier this summer, the Special Olympics top-level competition, the World Games, took place in Berlin, Germany, from June 17-25. Equestrian was one of 26 individual and team sports at this huge event.

As you may know, Special Olympics was [founded by Eunice Kennedy Shriver](#), with a mission to provide sports activities for people with intellectual disabilities and to change attitudes about disability. The first Special Olympics international competition hosted 1,000 U.S. and Canadian athletes at Chicago's Soldier Field in 1968. Over a half-century later, the organization now involves some five million athletes in 170 countries.

Equestrian wasn't part of Special Olympics initially. It became a World Summer Games sport in 1987 and first appeared at the Special Olympics USA Games in 2022. There are now at least 10 different equestrian disciplines recognized for Special Olympics competition, including:

- **Jumping** – Rider and horse complete a jumping sequence; the number of fences (four to eight total) and fence height depend on the level of competition.
- **Dressage** – Rider and horse perform a predetermined sequence of maneuvers, known as a “dressage test.” (Check out two [sample dressage tests](#) from Berlin 2023.)
- **Prix Caprilli** – Dressage with jumps.
- **English and Stock Seat (Western) Equitation** – An event official calls out actions to perform, such as gait changes, 10- and 20-meter circles, halt, figure-8, reverse, etc.
- **Working Trails** – Rider and horse navigate an obstacle course of objects like ground poles, logs, a labyrinth, a mailbox for removing and delivering items, a rope gate to open and go through, etc.
- **Showmanship** – Showing the horse from the ground.
- **Gymkhana** – Timed events like pole bending and barrel racing.
- **Drill Teams, Unified Drill Teams, and Unified Team Relays** – These are multi-rider events. In **Unified** events, athletes with and without intellectual disabilities team up to compete. Unified sports are found throughout Special Olympics.

Special Olympics equestrian competitions typically offer a subset of all the possible events described above. Berlin 2023, for example, included jumping, dressage, English equitation and working trails. The Abu Dhabi 2019 World Games had these same four events plus gymkhana.

# Equestrian Events at the Special Olympics

**Divisioning** is a Special Olympics process that groups athletes by skill level or ability, so everyone has a reasonable chance to win. Equestrian divisions break down like this:

- Level A: walk, trot, canter / Level B: walk, trot / Level C: walk.
- I = Independent riding / S = Supported riding, meaning a leader and/or sidewalker.

As an example, in a level **CS working trails** event, participants would walk their horse (level C), and would have the support of a leader and/or sidewalker (S = support).

In the U.S., some but not all state Special Olympics programs offer equestrian events. Michigan Special Olympics, for example, does not currently have equestrian, while our neighbors Indiana and Illinois do.
